To Whom it may concern,
has sought counsel from me concerning her religious conviction concerning stewardship of her body as the temple of God (1 Corinthians 6:19) in relationship to receiving any of the COVID vaccinations.
After talking with I agree that complying with the COVID-19 vaccination requirement would violate her sincerely held religious beliefs. Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S. Code § 2000e) prohibits discrimination against a sincerely held religious belief, practice or observance, and this right is reaffirmed by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) and extensive case law.
The development, production and/or testing processes of the current federally-authorized COVID vaccines subject to Hospital's vaccine mandate, as well as the existence of the fetal tissue industry, are contrary to her religious tenets and practices. Each of the currently available vaccines in question used multiple cell lines from aborted fetuses, including HEK-293, PER.C6, and/or MRC-5 fetal cell lines in the research, manufacturing and/or development of their vaccines. In addition, numerous aborted fetuses were used in the process of obtaining the established cell lines.
I agree that for to be vaccinated against her convictions concerning her body as the temple of the Holy Spirit would be sinful (James 4:17) for her because of the reasons stated. Therefore, I believe that is sincere in her conviction that at this time any COVID vaccinations would work against her deeply held religious belief that she has stewardship responsibilities of her body as the temple and should be exempt from any requirement to comply with any COVID vaccination requirements. This exemption would fall under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act (42 U.S. Code § 2000e), which prohibits discrimination against a sincerely held religious belief, practice or observance.
